OPEL H@H Study Consensus Event

NAHH trustees represented the NAHH members at a consensus event this month which presented the data findings of the OPEL H@H (optimum hospice at home services for end of life care) research project. Currently there are a range of different H@H services in the UK and it is unclear which features of these services enable better care and outcomes at the end of life for patients and families.


The aim of the project is to find out what features of H@H models work for whom and under what circumstances. The discussions were centred on context, mechanism and outcomes (CMOs) which produced lively debate and interesting perspectives. OPEL H@H will be publishing the results shortly, so look out for events and articles.
